COMMUNICATIONS &
COMMUNITY RELATIONS

The Cherokee Sheriff's Office Communications & Community Relations Office utilizes both traditional and social media to keep the community informed. Community Relations works with every department within the agency to better inform and connect with the public. In 2023, the department issued 65 news releases, maintained three social media platforms with a combined more than 70,000 followers, and issued 55 CodeRED notifications.

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS
DIVISION

The CSO Criminal Investigations Division, falling under the umbrella of Field Operations, is a stand-alone division tasked with the primary investigation of criminal activity. CID personnel respond to scenes and work cases for weeks and sometimes up to years later to achieve successful resolutions. CID units include: Major Crimes, Special Victims, Family Violence, White Collar, and Burglary Units. The Division is supported by a full-time Crime Scene Specialist and a dedicated Intelligence Analyst, with the goal of keeping CID on the forefront of modern investigatory practices.

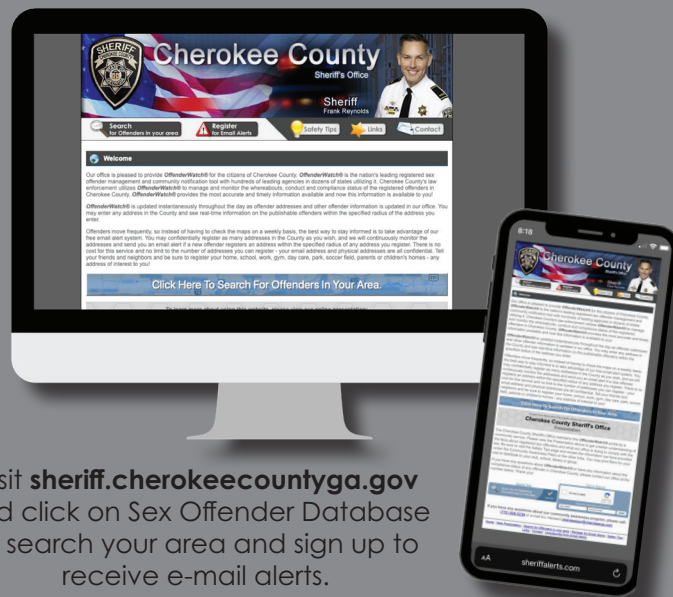
Larceny includes all thefts, misdemeanor and felony, except auto thefts, robbery, burglary, and fraud. Uniform Crime Reporting Statistics are maintained by the GBI. *Aggravated assault charges include those under the Family Violence Act. Subject to audit.

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS

In addition to its specialized units, the Criminal Investigations Unit manages and maintains several programs including managing the Sex Offender Registry for the county. State law requires that registered sex offenders report their address and workplace to be included in the registry, and CID personnel must verify those addresses annually. The Sheriff's Office verifies registered sex offenders twice per year. There are currently 164 sex offenders on the registry.

ON A LARGER SCALE

CSO participates in the Homeland Security Investigations Sexual Exploitation Unit, and highly trained CSO Internet Crimes Against Children detective is detached to HSI. Additionally, Capt. Lee Hands is a member of the Violent Criminal Apprehension Program.

The Adult Detention Center provides programming for inmates to help them develop skillsets that will assist them when they complete their sentence.

SERVSAFE

The ServSafe program, developed by the National Restaurant Association, trains people on proper food handling techniques. The program not only assists inmates who prepare meals for the inmate population, they also receive a five-year certification that can benefit them with employment in the food service industry once they are released from custody. In 2023, 42 inmates completed ServSafe certification.



HEALTH AND WELLNESS RESOURCE FAIR

The Adult Detention Center staff brought in more than a dozen organizations for a health and wellness resource fair to discuss services and future opportunities for inmates when they are released.



EDUCATION

Many inmates choose to use their time incarcerated for education. In 2023, 20 inmates enrolled in continuing education through Chattahoochee Technical College, 215 participated in a creative writing class, and 19 earned their GED.

FACILITY

The Adult Detention Center can house 1,113 inmates, including anyone arrested by the Cherokee Sheriff's Office or the city police departments of Woodstock, Canton, Ball Ground, and Holly Springs. The Adult Detention Center is accredited by the American Correctional Association and the National Commission of Correctional Health Care.

Irene Campbell handles the support functions of the jail operations, including maintenance, inmate transportation and information, transports, and intake, admission and release.

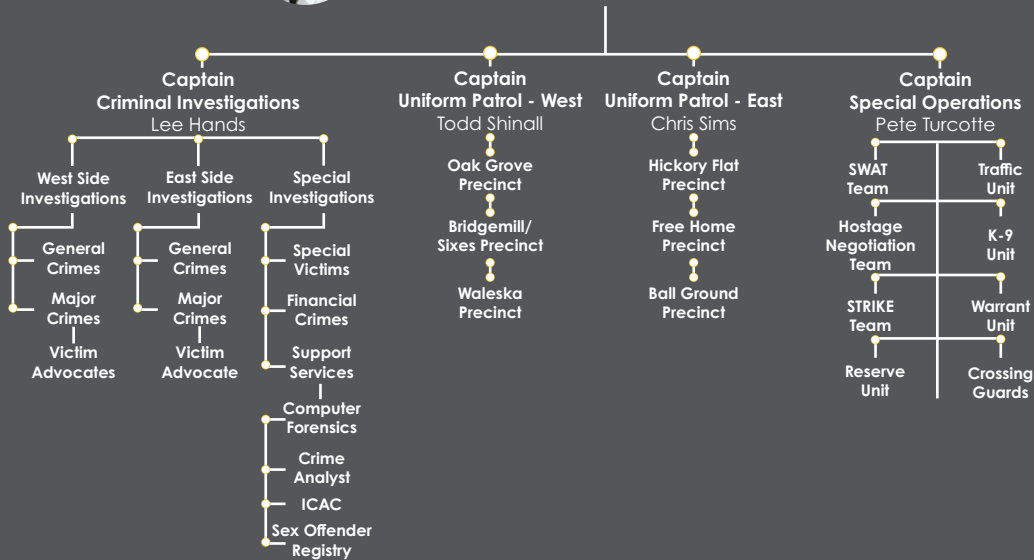

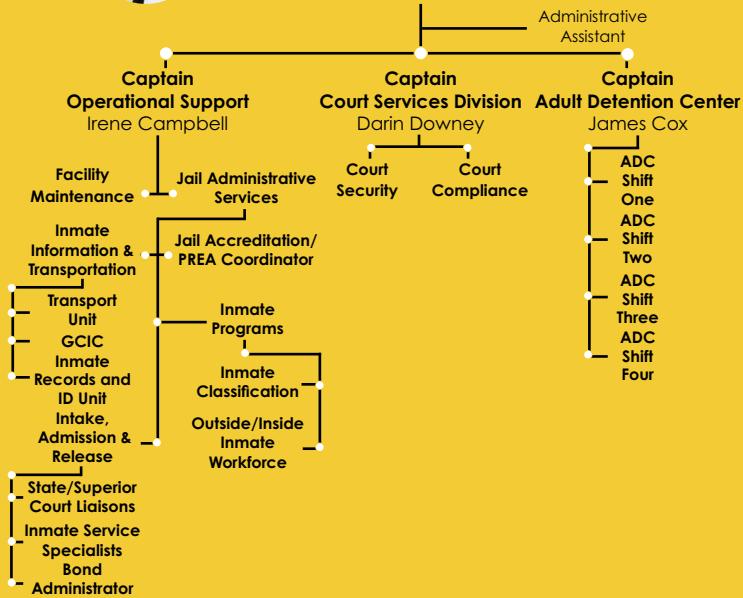

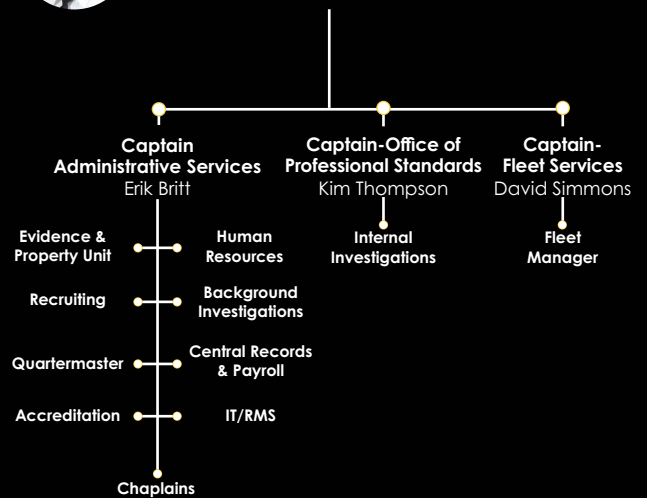

CAPTAIN PETE TURCOTTE
SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION

The Special Operations Division includes several areas that support Cherokee Sheriff's Office operations. Their roles are instrumental in the success of some of the most intense and stressful situations. The units of highly trained men and women include: Traffic Enforcement, Warrants, K-9, Hostage Negotiators, STRIKE Team, Motor Unit, and Reserves. It is overseen by Capt. Pete J. Turcotte.

HOSTAGE NEGOTIATIONS TEAM

The Cherokee Sheriff's Office Hostage Negotiation Team was formed in 1997 in response to school violence incidents. All multi-agency team members, including Woodstock Police, Canton Police, Holly Springs & Pickens Sheriff's Office, undergo an in-depth selection process, which requires that they demonstrate sound decision-making skills and heightened stability under pressure. The team is led by Lt. Brooke Anderson.

STRIKE TEAM

The STRIKE Team manages, organizes, operates, and delivers the CSO's fleet of specialty vehicles, including the Rescue Vehicle, All-Terrain Vehicles, Mobile Command Post, and other assets. They play a critical role in support at serious crime scenes, tactical situations, natural disasters, mutual aid assistance, and public relations presentations as directed by the Special Operations Commander.

WARRANT & CIVIL UNIT

The Warrant & Civil Unit fulfills many constitutionally mandated duties of the Sheriff's Office, including processing and executing orders of the court, Fieri Facias levies, writs of possession, as well as tracking, processing, and executing warrants issued. These actions accounted for 326 arrests, and over 14,601 services with an additional 6,380 service attempts in 2023. The Unit also arranges felony extraditions, serves subpoenas, 3,193 eviction notices, 156 evictions, 202 temporary protective orders (TPOs), and 102 transports for court-ordered mental evaluations. It also coordinates with the DA's office, Solicitor-General, Probation, Juvenile Justice, Department of Corrections, Clerk of Court and law enforcement agencies across Georgia and the U.S. There are currently nine deputies assigned to this unit. The unit is lead by Lt. Chris Bryant.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS



Central Location

The new Special Operations facility opened in December 2023 and now houses all Special Operations in one building, centrally located for better response. The facility features offices for the Traffic Unit, as well as a garage that allows for more thorough investigations. The facility also features kennels for all of the K-9s and a grassed area for training and exercise. The building also is home to the Cherokee County Coroner's Office.

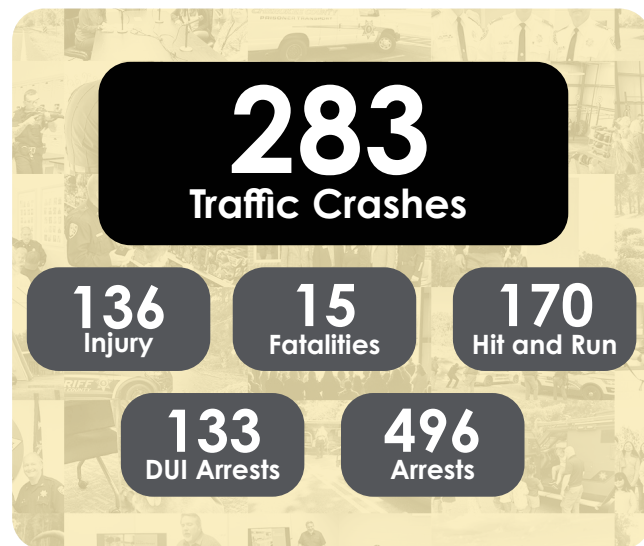


CSO Motor Unit

The Motor Unit started in the fall of 2002 to take advantage of the ability motorcycles have in maneuvering through congested areas. Motorcycles are a valuable resource for enforcing traffic violations. Additional benefits of the Motor Unit are representation of the Cherokee Sheriff's Office at law enforcement funerals and provides funeral escorts for various high-profile funerals.

TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT UNIT

The Traffic Enforcement Unit is a specialized unit with the goal of reducing traffic-related injuries and crashes through educational and enforcement efforts. This unit currently has eight highly trained deputies who investigate serious injury and fatality crashes throughout Cherokee County. Many of these deputies hold state and national certifications in crash reconstruction. In 2023, the Traffic Enforcement Unit investigated 283 crashes, including 136 injury crashes and 15 fatalities, and 170 Hit and Run cases. The Unit made 6,500 traffic stops, 133 DUI arrests, and 496 arrests. It issued 2,268 citations and 4,696 warnings. The unit is led by Lt. John Brookshire.

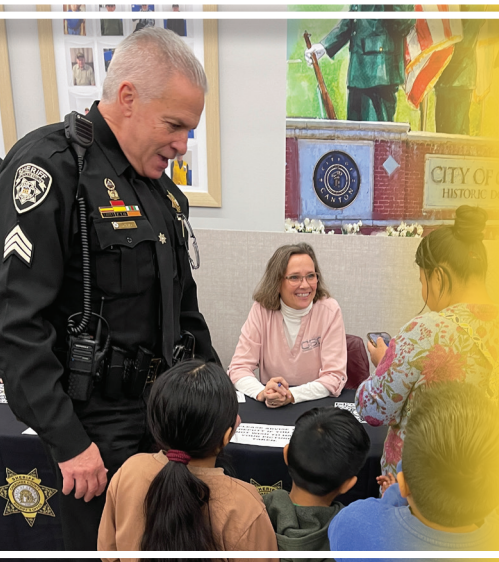
The Cherokee Multi-Agency SWAT Team is comprised of members from the Sheriff's Office, Woodstock Police Department, Holly Springs Police Department and Cherokee Fire & Emergency Services. The SWAT Team has partnered with the Cherokee County Medical Director to provide a higher level of patient care during critical incidents. All team members are required to pass a rigorous selection process. This process includes a physical fitness test, a shooting qualification test involving two back-to-back qualification scores of 90% or higher, followed by a 20-plus hour assessment period. Upon completion of the physical evaluation process, applicants go before a selection board, who make a final decision for team membership. All SWAT Team members are required and expected to maintain a high level of professionalism, physical fitness, and tactical knowledge. SWAT personnel are continuously increasing their skillset through the completion of courses such as the 95-hour Law Enforcement Counter Terrorism Course instructed by the Direct Action Resource Center. This is to ensure members of the Multi-Agency SWAT Team possess the skill and knowledge to handle such events as Barricaded Gunman, Hostage Situations, Terrorist Activities, Civil Disturbances, Woodland Searches, and any unique situation that occurs within the county.



CSO K-9 Unit



The Cherokee Sheriff's Office K-9 Unit has been a full-time unit since 1989. Currently, CSO has eight K-9 Teams that specialize in areas ranging from Tracking, Bomb Detection, Drug Searches, and Patrol Apprehension. The K-9 Team is lead by Sgt. Jared Jordan.

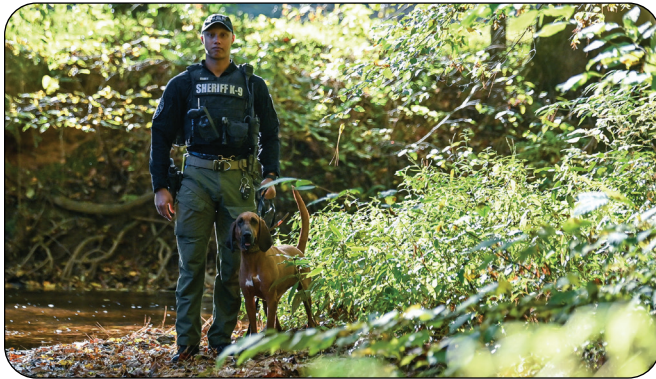


RESERVE UNIT

The Reserve Unit is the main support branch for the general operations of the Sheriff's Office. Members of the Reserve Unit work mainly in the Uniform Patrol Division, but can also be found in the Training Division, Crime Scene Unit, and Motor Unit. They also manage traffic control for special events. In 2023, the Unit volunteered a total of 3,355 hours, resulting in a payroll savings in excess of \$84,000. The Unit also coordinates the Christmas Joy Program through a "Shop With A Cop" format and provides holiday gifts to the elderly. In 2023, the Christmas Joy Program assisted 329 children and 100 elderly citizens of the county.

HAPPY RETIREMENT

Two K-9s retired from the Unit in 2023. K-9 Maggie and K-9 Xena faithfully served the citizens of Cherokee County since 2018. K-9 Maggie was the agency's first and only bloodhound and conducted 26 tracks, eight area searches and numerous public demonstrations. She was commonly asked for by name in the community. K-9 Xena is a Belgian Malinois and completed 80 narcotics searches, 22 tracks, 13 area searches, six article searches and numerous public demonstrations. Both K-9s will live out their retirement days with their handlers.



FUNERAL ESCORT UNIT

The funeral escort unit is comprised of two deputies who escort the majority of funerals through Cherokee County. This unit is a valuable asset to pay respect to those loved ones who are being laid to rest at the Georgia National Cemetery and other cemeteries throughout the county. This unit relieves patrol deputies from the escorts allowing them to focus on dispatched calls and patrols.

The training staff coordinates training for all personnel – both in-house and at other facilities. It is also their responsibility to develop and provide in-service training and conduct new hire orientation. The Roger Garrison Law Enforcement Training Center is utilized by local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies. The agency also partners with Reinhardt University, Columbus State University and the University of North Georgia to allow deputies to further their education.

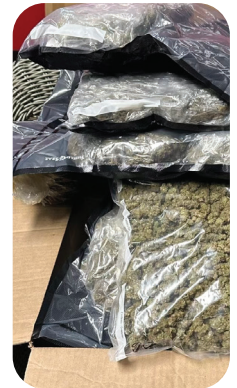
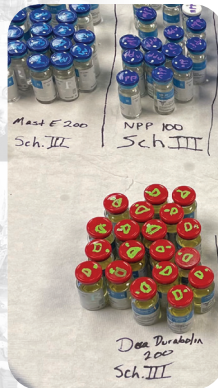
